(8p + postage) An NGC zine with seven regular games and an orphan from DER KRIEG. Press tends to heavy handed references to players or game comments, which is where most NGC press is these days, space-filler. An SF review column by Steve Doubleday is working through the old standards. Of most interest is the Local which this time covers SF, Dippy politics &c. The editor contributes an article on Poker. 24pp in all, indifferently laid out and mimeoed.

LEMMING EXPRESS (10) (Jon Lovibond, 1 Oak Lea Avenue, Fulshaw Park, Wilmslow, Cheshire) (6p + postage) This one's just recovering from 'O' levels (11th grade exams); it used to want to be a variant zine but soon discovered that regular is easier to fill: 4 regular, Multiplicity, Abstraction, Machervap - the last being about 12th cent Wales, 6 player. Another SF review, editorial, much shorter Local than normal. Good mimeo. The best of the newer independents.

IMPASSABLE (50) (John Boyer, 117 Garland Drive, Carlisle PA 17013, USA)
(12 for \$2.00) 7 regular, Scotice Scripti. Fast and dependable, a double column layout throughout can be confusing. News, an article on reviewing, list of US Game Openings. Mimeo.

POICTESME (14) (Bruce Schlickbernd, 6194 East 6th St, Long Beach, CA 90803, USA)
(10 for \$2) 4 regular. Reasonable spirit, 10pp. Not much else.

SPECULUM (17) (Dave Kadlecek, 1447 Sierra Creek Way, San Jose, CA 95132, USA)
(10 for \$2) Actually gives foreign rates! 2 regular and a bourse on both. Several pages of zine reviews, indifferent spirit.

1901... (48) (Mick Bullock, 14 Nursery Ave, Halifax, W Yorks HX3 5SZ)
(3p + postage) 16 or so regular, 1885, Schizo, Cline VII, Balkan War. --With so many games (some even with good press) not room for much else. Mimeo, no layout. As supplement WHO'S WHERE 8, a listing of who is in which UK zines: Andy Davidson now has a commanding lead of 40 games to Richard Scott's 29, with Peter Charlton at 27. One of the few UK zines with a 3-deadline year.

POLAR KNIGHT (6) (Ake Jonsson, Box 176, S-981 01, KIRUNA 1, Sweden)
(postage) 6pp mimeo, 2 regular. Confused Local and eccentric notation.

ARRAKIS (46) (David Head, POBox 1231, Huntsville, Ontario POA 1K0, CANADA)
(1¢ per page + postage) Mimeo, double column, 6pp. 5 regular, edited by three GMs with consequent loss of personality.

DIPLOMACY WORLD (7) (Walter Buchanan, RR3, Lebanon, Indiana 46052, USA)
(Quarterly, \$4 per year) 40pp litho. Now owned by Games Research, the 'official' magazine of the hobby, with 1 regular 'demonstration' game and lots of articles. Variant column by Lew Pulsipher, UK news by Pete Birks, Walker, Birsan. Recommended.

OWL & WEASEL (5) (Games Workshop, 15 Bolingbroke Rd, London W14)
(10p monthly) *2pp A5 litho, a miscellany of items on new games and such by an enterprising group of game freaks. They intend to run a one day event in September/October which looks like it will very much resemble the deceased GamesCon, as soon as the date is set we'll let you know.

THE GAMESLETTER (80) (Don Miller, 12315 Judson Rd, Wheaton, Maryland 20906, USA)
(10/7) Lists of contents of Dippy, wargame & Chess zines, book reviews, flyers, always a good check on what's going on in the games field.

DER KRIEG (40) (Graham Jeffery) We note this the last issue of one of the better UK zines which has now folded decently with games transferred elsewhere. DK is one we're sorry to lose: the independents seem to be gradually dying off.

Conan in Middle-earth, Part Thirteen:

It had taken all the Doctor's powers of persuasion to gain access to the Royal archives. The Steward seemed suspicious of wizards in general, but on hearing that they had come from Northern lands he was willing to trade for news. His elder son was on a mission in those parts, and Denethor was interested in conditions there.

While the Doctor conducted his search Conan went to investigate the military situation. The forward defences were in the ruined city of Osgiliath on the bank of the Anduin, though small raiding units were kept on the far bank in Ithilien. The previous summer had seen an assault on Osgiliath by the Fell Riders, as the leaders of the evil forces were named. This had been repelled at considerable cost. Denethor himself was not optimistic: a single attack he could hold, but he believed that the coming year would see threats from the North through Anorien and on the Southern coasts from Harad, led by the corsairs of those parts.

This policy of stubborn defence was not to Conan's taste at all. Mention of corsairs interested him - perhaps he could help here? He was therefore pleased when the Doctor announced that he wished to continue his researchs at Dol Amroth, a southern fief of Gondor.

Pergatore (PA)

The appointment of Elliptus Sceptii as Governor of the South is seen here as an indication that Polonius intends to get tough with the piratical fiend Sextus Pompeius.

A Party Political Statement (ES)

'I'm speaking on behalf of the new 'honest man' of Carthaginian politics. I mean of course Ellipticus Sceptii. When the other great forces are tearing our empire apart, what is needed is a man of honesty and integrity, who is not associated with any faction, who can rule fairly and with respect to democracy, with referenda on all important issues.
